Easy

Not easy, but straightforward and clear

Impossible

In 1998, a 95% save rate in Austin was...



We had a 85% death rate

1998: I had no idea what was happening until....



I vowed to do something to stop the killing

But what and how???

I went to work in the way I knew how...



Almost 100,000 surgeries and 9 years later...

Austin Animal Shelter 2007 statistics:



67% of cats killed

45% of dogs killed

14,055 total killed




Was that decade of my life effective in reaching my goal?



Lifesaving Recipe Step 3




Specify your Individual Animal Gap:

Any animal that is currently dying that is savable

How do you know who that is exactly?



Dig deep into your data!



Take a tally!

Pick two weeks in July and 2 weeks in January

Print out EACH dead animal's full record, including medical records and outcome notes







1. Lifesaving Vision



Lifesaving Vision- what is it and why is this important?



Making reaching 95% a priority in your community and instituting a culture of lifesaving in your organization.

Lifesaving Vision –HOW do you make it a priority?

Vision Statement of where your organization is going by when

Monthly or Annual Report displayed on website showing progress to Vision


Tie lifesaving into overall city strategic planning, etc.

Monthly communication publicly about what you need to get there

2. Population-Based Foster Program

What is the current point of your foster program?

- Give animals a break from shelter
- Provide better care
- Meet public expectations




The point really should be:

 Provide enough cages to have enough space to save them all



Population-Based Foster Program - Calculation Example

Dogs

Equation: Total dog intake per year X = 0.03 = dogs that should be in foster on any given day

Example: 10,000 X 0.03 = 300 dogs in foster on any given day

Cats

Equation: Total cat intake per year X = 0.08 = cats that should be in foster on any given day

Example: 5,000 X 0.08 = 400 cats in foster on any given day

Population Based Foster Program Metrics

How do you make sure this is working:

Measure the program success through Key Performance Indicators (KPI)

of animals in foster per year and at a time

of days to get into foster from shelter

of homes recruited per month






3. Progressive Adoption Policies



Progressive Adoption Policies

Progressive Adoption Goal Calculation

Dogs

Equation: Monthly Dog Intake x 0.7 = Monthly Dog Adoption Goal

Example: 600 dogs intake in June x 0.7= 420 dog adoptions

Cats

Equation: Monthly Cat Intake (cats over 8 weeks) + Kitten intake from month prior (kittens under 8

weeks) x 0.7 = Monthly Cat Adoption + SNR Goal

Example: 250 cats intake in June + 300 neonatal kittens in May x 0.7= 385 cat adoptions or SNR



If a metric is telling you something is not meeting a goal, there needs to be a reaction to right the ship long before euthanasia is considered.



4. Sheltered Community Cats Program Goal Calculation

You **don't** have enough Sheltered Community Cat Programming if you have:

>10% of cats over 8 weeks dying in the shelter



Sheltered Community Cat Program KPI

of spay/neuter per day for these cats (should equal the number who need it)

of days between intake and release

of cats euthanized over 8 weeks of age



5. Intake Diversion







Intake Diversion Goal and KPI

of people helped who didn't drop off


of animals in foster for stray hold or while vaccines kick in who then don't come in

GOAL:


Small community: 0.025 x people population

Large community: 0.014 x people populations

45% of all myths about human behavior are due to poor customer service at agencies



6. Progressive Return to Owner Policies



Progressive RTO Goal and KPI

Goal- 15-20% of total intake


KPI:

pets that are placed on other websites

of animals with signs left after field pick up

of calls placed per pet

of officer "free drive homes"



of people who don't reclaim after contact

7. Large Scale Transfer or Transport Programs



Goal: 10-15% of total outcomes

KPI's

- # of Pleas for % of animals
 - Response time
- # of days from plea to outcome
 - # agreements with partners
 - # euthanized animals

8. Disease Prevention



Don't let this happen on your watch....

- When you decrease euthanasia, your bad practices get exposed
- Fix them
- 72 hour intake flow

Disease Prevention KPIs

Goal: Close to zero animals die of contagious disease

KPIs

of animals died or euthanized for URI, Parvo, Panleuk, distemper, ringworm


of animals not getting vaccinated before intake

of complaints from adopters, fosters, and partners




9. Immediate Make Ready

- GOAL: No unnecessary hold times
 - # of days until photo, video, bio up on website from intake
 - # of days from intake until rescue plea sent
 - # of days from tag to pick up
 - # of days from adoption interest to pick up
 - # of days on hold for spay/neuter









10. Targeted Safety Net Programs

Goal: No vulnerable animal euthanized for space

Build safety net for each group beyond normal programming:

- # of Neonatal kittens dead
- # of Ringworm cats dead
- # of Parvo dogs dead
- # of Severe medical dead
- # of Behavior dogs or cats dead
- # of Feline Leukemia dead



11. Appropriate Capacity for Large Adult Dogs



Appropriate Capacity for Large Adult Dogs

Goal: no large dog dies unless the animal is suffering interminable pain or is so aggressive everyone is at risk today

KPIs

of large dogs dying for URI, behavior, injury, etc

of large dog adoptions per day (look at marketing too)

of large dog in foster and sent to foster per week (>35% of total dogs in foster is best practice)

of times large dogs get out of kennel each day (at least 2x is best practice)- walks or playgroup

of enrichment items per day



Appropriate Capacity for Large Adult Dogs

No Kill Best Practice:

- 1 kennel per 25 dogs taken in or
- 1 kennel per 40 dogs taken in if doubled (assuming not all are doubled)
- Assumes foster, adoption, and transfer program in place



12. Euthanasia List Scrutiny and Sharing



Euthanasia Scrutiny and Sharing KPI

Goal: Zero animals dead that do not need to be and less than 5% of total outcomes






